ETYMOLOGY (Chrysocephalum) Greek chrysos = golden + cephalon = head; The species apiculatum = Sharp

LIFEFORM 30-60cm Herb

ORIGIN Deepwater Q, Cobar NSW, Warrandyte Vic, SA, WA, NT, Tas

HABITAT Open forest, cliff edges. Found with many different Regional Ecosystems and soil types; **LEAVES** Basal, 1-6 cm x 2 mm, narrow obovate to oblong, variable in shape, white woolly, tip pointed,

base tapered, soft grey covered in dense white hairs;

FLOWERS Yellow, 5-6 mm, forming in rounded clumps of terminal clusters, in compact button-like heads:

Flowering Times: Jan, Feb, March, April, May, June, July, Aug, Sept, Oct, Nov, Dec

FRUIT Achenes, 1 mm, narrowly ovoid glabrous. Pappus a crown of 4-8 yellow, 4-6 mm barbed bristles;

angular with minute bristles & barbs, Many tiny feathery seeds from old flower heads: Fruiting

Times: Jan, Feb, March, April, May, June

STEM Herbaceous perennial with silver stems with rich velvety red new growth flush;

ETHNOBOTANY Colourful groundcover excellent rockery plant with contrasting foliage; Larval food plant for the *Venessa kershawi* Australian Painted Lady

INDIGENOUS USES Flowers soaked make a syrup for sore throats and colds;

COMMENTS Golden button-like flowering most of the year, Seed dormant for 12-18 months; Found Tunbridge

tip, Hillsides north of Bellerive on Hobart's eastern shore
