
Vitaceae Cayratia clematidea Slender Grape









ETYMOLOGY (cay-RAY-sha) Veitnamese name for one species; The species clematidea = like genus

Clematis Greek small vine

LIFEFORM Creeper 3-5 m long

STATUS Well conserved; Common Recorded at >655 Locations:

OCCURS Townsville, Rockhampton Qld to Bishops Ck NSW

QLD DISTRICTS Burnett, Cook, Darling Downs, Leichhardt, Moreton, North/South Kennedy, Port Curtis,

Wide Bay

HABITATOpen forest, Rainforest, Semi-evergreen/Araucarian Notophyll/Microphyll Vine forests **LEAVES**Alternate, 1-8 x 4 cm, compound 5 leaflets, thin succulent ovate, soft textured with coarsely

toothed margins;

FLOWERS Greenish, 5 mm, insignificant, 4 petals on grouped on common in clusters at end of long

stalks; Flowering Times Aug, Sept, Oct, Nov, Dec, Jan, Feb, March

FRUIT Berries, 5-7 mm, globular, black grape-like with 2-4 seeds; **Fruiting Times** Dec, Jan, Feb,

March, April, June

ROOTS Rootstock bearing small tubers each about 3 x 2 cm, tendrils

STEM Weak climbers with long tendrils; Older stems are angular; Fleshy striate slender much

branched stems;

ETHNOBOTANY Edible berries insipid reasonably palatable may irritate the throat; Cooked or roasted walnut

sized roots (tubers) eaten; Useful plant in hanging basket;

INSECTS Theretra oldenlandiae (Impatiens Hawk Moth), Acosmeryx anceus, Agarista agricola

(Joseph's Coat Moth), Argyrolepidia subaspera, Gnatholibus erotus, Hippotion celerio,

Hippotion scrofa, Theretra clotho, T latreillei, T. oldenlandiae (Moth)

BIRD Lewin's Honeyeater, Mistletoe Bird, Wompoo Fruit-dove, Rose Crowned Fruit-dove, Topknot

pigeon, Brown Cuckoo-dove, Regent Bowerbird

BUTTERFLY Phalaenoides glycinae (Grapevine Moth)

INDIGENOUS USES Root tubers eaten after roasting; Small black fruit eaten raw; ID FEATURE Only 5 leaflets regularly toothed, confused with Balloon Vine
