Ericaceae Woollsia pungens snow wreath









ETYMOLOGY (WOOL-zee-a) After Rev Dr William Woolls 1814-1893 born Winchester England died in

Sydney; The species Latin pungens (PUN-gens) ending in a sharp point, prickly; terminating

in a hard, sharp point, refers to the leaves.

LIFEFORM Herb 20cm-1m x 50cm Spread

STATUS Endemic to eastern Australia and ranges Monotypic genus; (Sole species) lives 10-20 years

in the wild; Widespread in coastal Fraser Island Qld, south coast NSW.

OCCURS Fraser Island Qld, Pigeon House Mt NSW

QLD DISTRICTS Moreton, Wild Bay

HABITAT Coastal Heath, dunes, Dry sclerophyll forest

LEAVES Alternate, 3.5-12 x1.5-6 mm, stiff overlapping, dark glossy, green concave, often

spreading, older leaves usually point downwards, sharp spiny tip on 1 mm stalks.

FLOWERS Tubular, 8-15 mm, white dark pink 5 spreading petal lobes, often wrinkled which together

form a flat plane; bracts ovate to triangular, acute, ciliolate. Sepals 8-10 mm. tube slender,7-

14 mm; lobes spreading, rhombic, 4-5 mm, finely mucronate.

Flowering times March, April, May, June, July, Aug, Sept

FRUIT Capsules, 2.5 mm, with many small seeds, average seed weight .2-0.25mg

STEM Erect understorey shrub, hoary-pubescent comprising of single stem lightly branched

covered in woolly hairs towards the end.

TOLERANCE Part-shaded spot with good drainage and ample moisture

LANDSCAPE USES Attractive scented flowers.

WILDLIFE Leaves eaten by swamp wallaby; Flowers (Pink flowers in Moreton Island) exude richest

most beautiful fragrances attract insects.

NATIVE BEES Lasioglossum (Homalictus) urbanus

BIRD Brown Honeyeater (fl)

ID FEATURE Leaves (right angles along stem) crowded, parallel veins + Flowers white fragrant tubular

with 5 overlapping petals. Pubescent styles and bracts.
