
## Elaeocarpaceae Tetratheca thymifolia black-eyed susan

**ETYMOLOGY** (tet-raTHEEK-a) Greek tetra = four + theke = case, referring to 4 cells of the anthers; The

species thymifolia (thyme-ee-FO-lee-ah) leaves like thymne; leaves like the culinary herb.

**LIFEFORM** Herb 30-60 cm x1.5m Spread

STATUS Widespread in Eastern Australia; from Fraser Island south to East Gippsland Vulnerable in

Vic; Wide Bay Northern limit of distribution; First cultivate in England in 1824.

QLD DISTRICTS

Darling Downs, Moreton, Wide Bay

Coastal Heath, Dry sclerophyll forest

**LEAVES** Whorls of 3-5, 20 x 8 mm, obovate to elliptic, hairy or hairless; margins rolled under, small,

pointed leaves in whorls of 3 to 5 around fine stem.

**FLOWERS** Pink or pale purple, 25 mm, pendant, oblong (4 petals, 8 stamens) with anthers dark

FRUIT Capsules, 4-6 mm, irregularly beaked, cordate to cuneate or depressed-globose; roughly

wedge-shaped, 4 celled containing 2.5-3 mm seeds Fruiting times All year

**ROOTS** Woody rootstock

**STEM** Erect ascending branches from woody stems; Slender, hairy, more or less erect terete,

stems with bristly ridges.

**LANDSCAPE USES** Herb compact clump; Excellent plant for an outdoor container.

**WILDLIFE** Flowers have strong fragrance on hot days which attract insects.

**ID FEATURE** Leaves whorled in 4's, narrowly elliptical to almost orbicular, shiny, margins loosely, revolute

+ Flowers pendent, lilac pink, solitary.
